

## Update on Arborfield Garrison Development Plans

### Planning Application

Barkham Parish Council has had further meetings with both Crest Nicholson, who are the main developers, and with Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) planners. The first piece of news is that the new application is unlikely to be submitted before August 2014. This is because Crest have decided that they want to review the previous plans in their entirety. However we are expecting that they will reveal some of the supporting documents in advance and will share their thoughts on some of the main issues well before the application is finally submitted. Construction is still expected to start at the beginning of 2016.

### Vacating the Site

The REME are advancing their plans to vacate the base by the end of 2015. Training is scheduled to end in October 2015 and to resume at Lyneham in January 2016. This will allow time to arrange the transfer of staff and equipment which will be an intricate logistical exercise.

The Garrison Church will remain but the stained glass windows will be removed and replaced with clear glass. The memorial garden will be relocated to the

back of the church. Trees which have been planted in memory of soldiers will be retained. The REME museum will be moved to Lyneham, but the possibility of setting up a small heritage centre in the Infirmary Stables is being considered – see below. A small number of personnel who work at Aldershot will remain in the existing military housing.

### Transport

Planning for the road network is still at an early stage. At the moment consultants are working on a traffic modelling exercise which will cover a wide area between the M4 and M3, east as far as Bracknell and west beyond the A33. Taking into account the many other developments in Wokingham and neighbouring authorities, this is obviously a complex exercise. Importantly the consultants involved are taking into account the planned Arborfield bypass – their predecessors appeared to studiously ignore this proposal!

On the subject of the bypass, I have seen a provisional timetable for building the road. It is expected to go to the WBC Executive for approval in March. A detailed examination of the proposed route, including any engineering implications and land ownership, will then be carried out. This will then be followed by the formal planning process and tendering for contractors. Construction should be completed by the end of 2019.

### Flooding

Flooding, not surprisingly, has risen up the agenda as an issue to resolve. Areas that have flooded in recent weeks in and around the site have been noted; for example a section of Biggs Lane

was flooded. It will be necessary to improve watercourses and importantly to prepare locations for water capture to reduce the downstream flows. As a target it should be possible to ensure that run-off from the site is not increased and even a significant reduction ought to be achievable. The lake to the east of Biggs Lane will provide a useful water holding area but more will need to be done.

### Secondary School

It is anticipated that Crest will soon have some news on their proposals for a secondary school within the development area, in particular the proposed location. A new secondary school is urgently required for the southern part of the borough. As part of the planning application, the developers would be expected to provide school sites for a secondary school and two primary schools. They will also be expected to provide partial funding for the secondary school (as it will not serve exclusively the development site) and full funding of the primary schools.

WBC, meanwhile, have taken the trouble to set up some meetings with parents to facilitate discussion about possible ways a new school could be opened. The third in this series of meetings will take place at the Finchampstead Baptist Centre on 19 March at 7.30pm.

The quickest way to open a new school under current regulations is by creating a free school that is funded by the Department for Education. A group has been set up with the aim of progressing a free school proposal, using the acronym SOW (South of Wokingham). This would have been most encouraging but unfor-

tunately their plan is to take over West Court, which is currently an officers' mess. It is located well to the south of the Garrison towards Eversley and it is doubtful whether this building and its site have adequate capacity. The relative remoteness of this location and poor access will not be attractive to Barkham parents.

Barkham Parish Council would welcome the opportunity to have a meaningful discussion with the SOW group but lines of communication have become very strained.

There is a great danger that if the whole process of school provision is mismanaged, then the area could still end up without a new secondary school. Consequently I urge any parents who did not attend the two previous meetings to attend the meeting on 19th March. It is especially important that as many Barkham parents as possible should attend, as the meeting venue inevitably led to the discussions at the first meeting being biased towards the needs of Finchampstead.

### Utilities

Plans are beginning to emerge regarding necessary upgrades to utilities for the site. In particular we have learned that Thames Water intend to upgrade the existing sewage works (on the edge of The Coombes at Wood Lane) within its current footprint. At this stage the time scale for this work is not known and also it is unclear whether any ancillary projects, such as additional pipelines, are required.

### Garrison Stables

The future of the stable blocks in the Garrison is under consideration. These buildings are

adjacent to Tope Crescent and can be viewed externally. They were designated as a Scheduled Ancient Monument in 1979 and are currently on the English Heritage Buildings at Risk Register. This means that they are in a serious state of dilapidation but they cannot be demolished.

The stables were built just before the First World War when the garrison was established as an Army Remount Depot. Especially in view of the centenary of the war, it is appropriate that these buildings should be restored and put to good use. It is hoped that the grass area in front of the stables which was formerly a paddock will be retained.

The obvious solution would be to use part of the buildings as a museum, perhaps with a "War Horse" theme. Other ideas, which could co-exist with a museum, would be to include a cafe and may be some small craft or retail units. With the new village centre located nearby, this could be a workable proposition. Alternatively they could be returned to their original use as stables, should any of the local horse riding groups be interested in leasing them.

Without question, the biggest problem will be how to raise the money for restoration and conversion, along with finding a viable long term solution. Barkham Parish Council has agreed to take the lead investigating possible financing sources, such as lottery funding, heritage grants or development funds. Clearly this is something else to keep us busy!

the requirements with regards to accessibility and must provide an excellent environment which meets the full requirements of educational needs academically at the same time offers a full range of sports facilities. It is also important that any new school has the capacity to grow to support future requirements in the south of the borough.

A recent meeting at Finchampstead Baptist Church gathered together a group of some seventy parents and councilors from the parishes and WBC to discuss what sort of school we would like and where we would like it to be and there are a number of additional meetings planned going forward details of which can be obtained from the education department at Wokingham Borough Council (WBC).

#### Investing in the Borough's future despite tough challenges

WBC faces continued financial pressures following expected ongoing reductions in government funding of approximately £3.3million and has released its detailed budget proposals for 2014/15.

The budget sets out how much money is available for the council to deliver its services during the next three years, and how that money will be spent. And despite central government's austerity programme with local authorities bearing the brunt of this, WBC is still ploughing £80.4million capital into its key vision priorities of education, infrastructure, country parks, leisure and housing during the coming year. In addition we are protecting frontline services once again, as the council is set to increase its investment to protect its vulnerable adults.

At the February council meeting, WBC agreed its share of the overall council tax for 2014/15 at £1,246.21 for Band D, representing a 1.9% rise or a rise of 46pence per week. Wokingham remains the lowest funded unitary authority in the country. The average council receives 46.5% funding – nearly double what Wokingham Borough receives (24%) - the rest is raised through council tax even so the council saw a reduction of just under 10% on its main grant.

Wokingham Borough will get around £28million general grant from the government, while the remainder of its budget is raised through council tax (£85million) – meaning approx. 24 pence in every pound comes from the government. With approx. £2million inflation, more than £3million statutory spending pressures and a reduction in government grant of more than £3million, this leaves a deficit of around £8million. As the public purse shrinks and we face huge financial pressures as well as an ever increasing demand on our services. The council will have to save in excess of £20million over the next three years to balance its books. This does not include future potential changes to social care legislation which could increase this amount by a further £4million.

#### Interesting Financial Facts

The majority of council services are statutory (80% of budget - £90million) and include adult social care, children's services, waste collection and disposal and highways. Non-statutory services (20% - £23million of budget) include libraries, leisure facilities, parks and open spaces and bus subsidies.

The way in which government allocates money to local authorities has changed.

Previously money was allocated to what was known as the formula grant. From 2014/15, the government has introduced a settlement funding assessment which is made up of the formula grant (which wasn't ring-fenced meaning it could be spent on any council services) plus previous ring-fenced grants which have to be used for specific activities.

Under the old formula grant process, the council receives from central government just £71.47 per person compared, for example, with Slough which gets £289.13, and Reading £247.58. The unitary average is £265.36 based on formula grant calculations).

Under the new settlement funding assessment, the council receives from central government just £174.76 per person compared, for example, with Slough which gets £409.92, and Reading £384.67. The unitary average is £395.16. The council has saved approx. £25million since March 2010 (up to March 2015) and each member of council staff serves approx. 185 residents – the council's believes this is the lowest in the country

### 'Good Question!'

'There's probably no God. Now stop worrying and enjoy your life.'

'There definitely is a God. So join the Christian Party and enjoy your life.'

Is it a good or a bad sign when discussion of some of the most important questions any of us will ever face gets reduced to slogans on the side of London buses? I'm not sure. And I'm certainly not sure that believing in God means you have to join the Christian Party.

It's strange, though. We're constantly being told that we live in an age that doesn't really believe in the idea of actual, 'everyone-should-believe-this' truth any more, and when it's supposed to be the height of rudeness to challenge someone else's beliefs. And yet it turns out that an awful lot of people find it very hard just to let go of the idea of that kind of truth, and stop challenging one another's ideas in this way.

So we've got to be ready to talk about truth – haven't we? Surely we need to hang on to the art of respectfully asking questions about each other's beliefs, before we forget how to do that altogether.

Jesus was fascinating. I don't think it's possible to imagine anyone more sure of what he

believed – both about who he was and what he'd come to do. But there must have been something about him that invited questions. He was asked so many: 'Who are you?' 'Which is the greatest commandment in the law?' 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?' 'Who then can be saved?' And many, many more...

Again, that's strange. In our experience, it's often the people with very fixed views about things who most hate being questioned about those views. But Jesus was different. He never hid away from challenge. He had no interest at all in blind, unthinking faith, but expected people to use their minds as they grappled with and probed away at the claims he made and the things he did.

One of the sad things about working for a church is meeting people with all kinds of big questions about life and meaning, who would love to come along to engage with and even challenge the Christian answers to those questions, but fear they simply won't be welcome if they do.

We so don't want to be like that at Barkham Church. In fact, roughly around the time this article goes to print, we will be running a week of events entitled 'Good Question!', engaging with some of the main questions people today have about Christianity, and providing opportunities for them to ask plenty more.

Missed those events? Or simply don't believe us? Why not come along one Sunday, and try us? I think I can promise – no serious question will be ignored or turned away. So what's to lose?!

### Save Our Society!

The Society is now in its twelfth year and is in danger of folding for want of a Chairman. Barry Salter was its instigator and has been in the driving seat for a number of years. ## Heartstart Swallowfield

What is Heartstart? It is a British Heart Foundation initiative which teaches people what to do in a life-threatening emergency – simple skills that save lives. It aims to facilitate and support Emergency Life Support (ELS) skills training in the community. We are the nearest Heartstart Scheme for all around Wokingham, including Barkham. Depending on numbers we are always willing to travel and deliver the courses locally.

Every year around 124,000 people in the UK suffer a heart attack. Many of these people then suffer a cardiac arrest and die before reaching hospital. Without resuscitation, cardiac arrest is always fatal. Performing CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) immediately can double the person's chances of survival.

Heartstart Swallowfield is able to teach members of the public Emergency Life Skills (ELS). ELS Skills are actions that are required to keep someone alive until further professional medical assistance arrives on the scene.

Training is free, although donations to cover our running costs are welcomed, and can be attended by anyone over the age of ten.

Training sessions take place between Swallowfield Parish Hall and Spencers Wood Pavilion and booking is essential as we can only cater for 12 delegates. We can, upon request, also conduct a training session for a particular group of people or company.

The course normally lasts for 2.5 hours and anyone above the age of 10 can attend. (contact us if you

are a school or club who wish to have training).

Topics covered include:

- Priorities / the conscious casualty
- The unconscious casualty
- Cardiac arrest
- Suspected heart attack
- Choking
- Introduction to the AED

The course is delivered as a mixture of practical, theory and video so no previous experience / knowledge is required. At the end of the training, providing you complete the course, you will be presented with a certificate.

## Walk the Path

Explore a natural hidden gem in all its spring glory

The Blackwater Valley Countryside Trust (BVCT) is offering outdoor fans a special opportunity – to walk a stretch of one of this area's most delightful natural features, the Blackwater Valley Path, including a few special sections not normally open to the public.

The River Blackwater is a hidden gem right on our doorstep. On Sunday 27th April participants in Walk the Path 2014 will be able to enjoy the last 17 kilometres (10 miles) of its Path, from Sandhurst to Swallowfield – a riverside walk through beautiful rural countryside in all its spring glory.

This highly successful event – now in its ninth year – is organised by the Blackwater Valley Countryside Trust – and pre-booking is essential. Places are limited and last year's event sold out. Taking part costs just £6 for BVCT members and £10 per person for non-members.

Other features of this event include:

- transport at either the walk start or finish (because it's a linear walk);
- refreshment points en route;
- a collection service if you are unable to finish the walk for whatever reason;
- variable start times from 9.15am to 11am to avoid congestion;
- a walk leader, back marker and designated walk guides;
- route maps so you can walk at your own pace;
- dogs welcome but due to minibuses regulations you'll

need to make your own transport arrangements.

If you've never explored this part of the Berkshire/Hampshire borders, this is the perfect opportunity to do so. The Blackwater Valley is maintained as an open space along the borders of the counties of Berkshire, Hampshire and Surrey. It runs for approximately 30 km, from the source of the River Blackwater at Rowhill Nature Reserve near Aldershot in the south, northwards to Swallowfield where the river joins the River Whitewater and then the Loddon.
