
The Social section (pp12-13) this time includes reports on the successful Skittles evening and the annual Easter Egg Hunt, plus news of the next events.

## News from your Parish Council

#### Parish Clean Up Day

The Parish Clean Up Day on the 25<sup>th</sup> March was again very successful this year, with lots of residents turning up to help clear the parish of litter. A total of 90 bags of rubbish and recycling were collected from around the Parish and several large items were also collected.



#### **Planning applications**

The Parish Council continues to fight against more development in the area. Just recently we have opposed a large development on land North and South of School Road. A leaflet drop to residents close by was undertaken to raise awareness of this application which, if approved, would have a huge impact on traffic along School Road and the area in general. You can keep you up to date via the BVRA Development Watch (see BVRA website, barkham. org.uk).

Our other major concern is possible development at Barkham Square, this site joins on to the development at Arborfield Green, stretching from Commonfield Lane to Langley Common Road. WBC have highlighted this area as a possible site for more development

#### Vacancy for a Councillor

The Parish Council still have a vacancy for a new councillor. There are many changes coming to Barkham and this is your opportunity to become more involved.





#### Arborfield and Barkham Neighbourhood Plan

First of all, I would like to draw to your attention that there will be a public exhibition on **Saturday 23rd June, from 10am to 1pm at the Arborfield Green Community Centre, Sheerlands Road** to launch a six week consultation on the Arborfield and Barkham Neighbourhood Plan.

Members of the Steering Group, who have put the Draft Plan together, will be available to discuss the proposals and to answer questions. There will be some exhibition material outlining the proposed policies, to explain how the plan evolved and to map out the remainder of the process.

The new Neighbourhood Plan as drafted has used information from a number of sources:

- The Residents' Survey carried out in late 2016 and results from the earlier public consultation
- Work done by a number focus groups comprising local residents
- Contributions from other organisations, including other Neighbourhood Plan groups
- Landscape views submitted recently by many local people

• A variety of studies prepared by members of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and from other sources.

Sustainability is the "Golden Thread" which runs through planning, according to the government's National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). The NPPF goes on to suggest this should be achieved through a range of themes including a prosperous rural economy, sustainable transport, a wide choice of quality homes, conserving and enhancing the natural and historic environment. All these themes are relevant to Arborfield and Barkham. It is the intention of the Neighbourhood Plan that these sustainability concepts are treated seriously, not just used as a fig leaf for what happens to be expedient.

The policies themselves are built around four main themes:

- Identity and rural setting, in particular to preserve open spaces between the various settlements within the two parishes
- Thriving Communities, ensuring that the proposed community assets promised as part of the Arborfield Green development are actually delivered
- Appropriate housing, determining that new housing must be contained within existing settlement boundaries or on brownfield sites. Generous provision of open space and landscaping is also required.
- Getting Around: new development must not increase traffic on unsuitable roads and a local network of green routes for non-motorised users should be created.

Once the consultation period is completed, it is anticipated that there will be some adjustments to the plan to take account of comments received. It will then have to be submitted to Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) for their comments, specifically so they can check that it is compatible with their own planning policies. This will allow the plan to be finalised, ready for an examination to be carried out by a planning inspector. Subject to the inspector being satisfied, the plan will finally go to a public referendum

When it has been adopted, the Neighbourhood Plan must be taken into account in the determination of all planning applications in Arborfield and Barkham. It will immediately become an important consideration in the planning process.

The Steering Group hope to see you on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. If as many residents as possible respond to the consultation, then the Plan can be completed and submitted, strongly supported as a plan "for the community, by the community".

#### Barkham Square

The elephant in the room is the proposal to site up to 1,000 additional homes at Barkham Square. Here is a good example of sustainability being sacrificed for the sake of expediency. WBC are desperate to identify more housing land so that they can meet the government's targets. Barkham Square has been identified as a possible site, in spite of the site having access only via the existing local road network - the juxtaposition of likely access points will mean that the proposed Arborfield Cross Relief Road and Nine Mile Ride Extension will serve no useful purpose

in serving Barkham Square. Besides the loss of open countryside, it will be a big step towards engulfing Barkham in a westward urban sprawl, all the way from Wokingham to Arborfield.

Chris Heyliger and John Kaiser have written elsewhere in the BVRANewsletter about Barkham Square. It is essential that local residents make their feelings known to WBC, otherwise we will be ignored and treated as a soft option. It is proposed that a petition be arranged and when a public consultation takes place, as many people as possible should respond.

## Up to 1000 more houses targeted at Barkham

Construction of the 3,500 homes planned for the SDL covering Barkham, Arborfield, Finchampstead and Swallowfield is already underway. But now Barkham is being targeted for up to 1000 more houses at Barkham Square adjacent to Arborfield Green.

Your opinion on further housing and traffic in the area counts and Barkham Parish Council will over the coming weeks develop a petition.

Barkham Square is a Green Field site bordered by Langley Common Road, Barkham Street, Commonfield Lane and the temporary film studios at Arborfield Green.

Over 200 plus sites across Wokingham were put forward by landowners for the next local plan and Barkham Square was one of only three sites selected for a Master Planning exercise commissioned by Wokingham Borough Council. Whereas developers will see this as convenient tack on to Arborfield Green (Development Creep), Barkham Parish Council believes that any further development of this scale in Barkham is not sustainable and this site is not suitable for such development because:

The site is outside the settlement area in a Countryside location. It is land locked with access only on to rural country roads and lanes.

It is outside the 'redline' green separation area specified for Arborfield Green to create a buffer between Barkham and Arborfield Green.

It is amidst historic farmland adjacent to an area of special char-

acter near the medieval centre of Barkham and listed buildings like Barkham Manor, The Bull etc.

It would inevitably lead to a loss of veteran trees and affect the local wildlife.

It is in an area prone to flooding; the main drainage channel from Arborfield Green flows across the site.

Above all, it will lead to even more congestion on Barkham Road, Barkham Street, Bearwood Road and other country roads and lanes. Residents will be all too aware of the problems in the area caused simply by roadworks.

If the Masterplanners report which was designed to establish the viability of the schemes 'without prejudging planning approval' is approved by Wokingham Borough Executive a Public Consultation will follow.

We will keep you updated and advise you further how you can express your views directly and/ or via a petition.

There will need to be 1500+ objections in order to secure a debate by the full Wokingham Borough Council to help defeat this project.

Town centre regeneration

The problem with this means there will be disruption as the work is carried out and this affects everyone, and I would like to apologise on behalf of the council for the inconvenience while the work is progressed. The council has been accused of destroying a large number of trees to enable the work to be carried out and this is true but the council are committed to replacing as many trees as possible, I did hear a figure the other the day that the council has planted over 30,000 trees around the borough so we can hardly be



I wanted to talk about the plans to regenerate Wokingham Town centre even though it is not in Barkham it has an effect on all of us who use the town centre on a regular basis. I have included an illustration which shows the planned outcome for Elms Field, which is designed to make it an area of the town which can be enjoyed by residents. The plans are to build a market place with facilities for both day and night time events and activities, to extend the cultural and social opportunities which will include a new cinema and a 400-seat concert hall facility at the new Carnival pool complex and to deliver a new town park with 21st century equipment for outdoor concerts and cultural events in addition to a new play area for children and young people at Elms Field.

accused of being anti-trees and I believe trees are such an important part of the landscape and bring such joy I have successfully fought to get blanket tree preservation orders where there was a danger of losing trees near or on developments.

#### Development

We continue to press the government to change planning rules so that the more than 9,000 permissions granted by the Council are considered during planning appeals. In the first 8 months of 2017/18, 1183 new homes were built, and we have identified a further 1,467 homes currently under construction. This improved delivery trend has allowed us to recalculate our 5-year land supply as now standing at 6.8 years.

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This will assist the council in defending against inappropriate sites put forward by speculative developers.

There is also the update of the local plan which continues as although the council has a 6.8 year land supply for delivering housing we are required to have a rolling land supply and as developers are delivering in the region of 150 houses a month each one them must be replaced with an additional approved house to maintain the land supply as required by the government. One of the possible sites put forward for assessment by developers is Barkham Square with a suggestion of a development of up to 1000 houses, I, along with the parish council are against this proposal as its location and road network is not suitable for a development of such a scale and even though it is still currently merely a proposal I will be fighting to ensure that this site is removed from the local plan update. The council are on track to deliver its new bridge at Barkham. Preliminary engineering work continues and delivery is planned for 18 months' time and I am sure it has not gone unnoticed that there has been a major upgrade of services around the Bull. This is an area where we constantly have seen flooding in the past hopefully the works will help solve this historic problem.

This was followed by a heat wave for two days in April followed by more cool days with plenty more rain. Now, as I write, we have another spell of hot weather in early May. This late and strange spring has had some unusual effects in my patch.

There has been amazing cherry blossom, followed by spectacular apple blossom, as my main photo shows. The bluebells were fantastic this year and the wisteria is at its peak just now with a strong and beautiful fragrance wafting into the house.

It has been so cold and wet that I sowed my seed potatoes a month later than normal, so new potatoes will be later than normal. However the new potatoes are just poking through the soil today, less than two weeks after sowing, so they are wasting no time.

I've had a real flurry of activity over the past couple of weeks catching up, once the soil was warm enough. In addition to the potatoes I've sown carrots, parsnips, spinach, more broad beans, peas, leeks and shallots.



In the greenhouse the tomatoes and aubergines are doing really well and the cucumber is following on behind because I forgot to sow the seeds!

Butternut squash, sweet corn, French and runner beans are germinating.

Finally I've pretty much caught up with what I would have expected to have done by now. I now have time to look a little more carefully at the fine details, like checking the fruit trees to see if the fruit has set, looks like plenty of pears, and keeping an eye out for the gooseberry sawfly which can devastate the foliage if it remains undetected.

Of last year's crops we are still eating carrots and parsnips in the fridge and some has been converted into soup stored in the freezer. The spinach has started to re-grow and is producing some succulent leaves. Also the rhubarb has shot into action and is the best I've had, unfortunately Pam has recently found out that she is intolerant of it!

It's fun watching the birds on the feeders. Goldfinches are so colourful. To keep the squirrels off Pam has found an electric spinner that rotates when a squirrel lands on it and throws them off! Quite entertaining! The roe deer have been away for a couple of weeks, perhaps they have new fawns. The grass has been growing very rapidly this past 2-3 weeks meaning regular lawn mowing. That reminds me, I need to book the tractor and mower to cut the field in a few weeks.

**Arborfield Gardening** Association



Hello Everyone!

Saturday 5th May was National Naked Gardening Day - hope you all had fun!

Have you all seen the green wall at the heart of the transformed town centre in Bracknell? It's one of the largest in Europe and contains about 10,000 plants. It stretches for half a mile along the Lexicon shopping centre.

Our March meeting took place on World Water Day

Today, 2.1 billion people live without safe drinking water at home; affecting their health, education and livelihoods.

"Sustainable Development Goal 6" commits the world to ensuring that everyone has access to safe water by 2030, and includes targets on protecting the natural environment and reducing pollution.

..... but it also includes suggestions about how we can help in our own homes and gardens.

Members enjoyed a very enthusiastic talk by Jonathan Hogarth on Hogarth Hostas. He holds the National Collection of Small and Miniature Hostas. In 2016, at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show, he was presented with a Silver-Gilt Medal and at the RHS Hampton Court Palace Flower Show, a Gold Medal and the "Best Plant Heritage Exhibit" award for his collection of Hostas. In 2017 he was presented with a Silver Medal for his beautiful display of miniature and small Hostas at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show.

Jonathan began his very successful love affair with Hostas when he bought a house here in Melrose Gardens which came with one Hosta! From there, ten years and two children later, he went to visit some friends and saw some different Hostas there. Previously he had thought there was only a green Hosta! So he acquired a vellow one, then a blue one, and then he found the variegated ones, so he came away with twelve different Hostas. He knew how to grow Hostas by then, as for 10 years he'd successfully looked after his plant - he'd put a few slug pellets around and it almost looked after itself. Previously writing about the Hostas he had successfully grown, Jonathan now thinks the slugs read his articles!

Then Jonathan found a specialist Hosta nursery, and joined the British Hosta and Hemerocallis **Society**, of which he has recently been appointed as Chairman! In 2005 he went to the American Hosta Association's convention and he's never looked back and in fact goes there every year since. One can find the newest plants in America.

Jonathan spoke about his experiences at the world famous gardening shows, where, as a newcomer, he has had such incredible success. He amused us with several funny anecdotes and advised on various ways of exhibiting plants. With his unstoppable passion for this particular plant genus, this was a very stimulating talk.

Ionathan's talk also included a description of the success he has had with the X-Stream Aeroponic Propagator system, which is made only in Britain. This system produces viable plants from 80% of his Hosta cuttings - he says it works with everything else, including roses, geraniums & fuschias.

Cuttings are placed straight into the propagator - with no rockwool blocks or cubes. Plants are fed with a fine nutrient and water spray. As they grow, bare roots are exposed so nutrients go straight to the roots. Plants will therefore absorb far more nutrients and you'll see surges in growth! Expect rapid rooting, too as root growth is unrestricted by growing media and roots get a constant supply of oxygen, producing huge roots in record time

Jonathan recommends the 20 Plant (Unheated) version which costs around £65

In April, Angela O'Connell spoke to us on the National Garden Scheme, which since 1927 has been inviting garden owners to open their exceptional gardens to the public for good causes, giving people unique access to some of Britain's most beautiful, memorable gardens for around the same cost of a cup of tea and a slice of cake. Over the last 90 years, they have donated £50 million to charities across the UK.

A new report reveals Britain has lost half its hedgehogs in less than two decades. Habitat loss is devastating the population of our prickly pals.

Hedgehogs, Erinaceus europaeus, are a woodland edge species that also make use of hedgerows and suburban gardens. The State of Britain's Hedgehogs 2018 report says Britain has lost half its hedgehogs in less than two decades. The main causes are habitat loss and lack of landscape-scale connectivity.

Woodland edge and hedgerow destruction and poor management are major contributing factors in hedgehog decline, causing habitat loss and reducing macroinvertebrates available for food. The use of pesticides on farmland and garden plots can have detrimental impacts on hedgehogs and their food supply. In urban areas the use of impermeable fencing, loss of compost heaps and increasing development are other major issues.

#### Supporting hedgehog survival

Compost heaps are a favourite home for hedgehogs and providing holes or gaps in fences and hedges will allow them access to your land.

A range of hedgehog products are available in garden centres and shops, including hedgehog houses which offer shelter for our prickly guests. You can also provide food in your garden, but not bread and milk as they are bad for their stomachs. A constant supply of drinking water is essential, especially during times of frost and drought, while hedgehog food, dog food, minced meat or cat biscuits are ideal.

It has been a long gap since our last concert, but in addition to a String Workshop in May, a lot of work has been going on behind the scenes for our Summer Concert which is on **Saturday** 30th June at The Old Gym, Wel**lington College, Crowthorne at** featured in the 1996 film 'Shine', 7.30pm.

The programme has a distinctly Russian flavour, opening with Kabalevsky's lively overture "Colas Breugnon". Kabalevsky wrote his opera in 1934, based on a novel by French author Romain Rolland telling the story of a 16th century master craftsman whose incurable optimism is a major theme. The opera was not very successful, but the overture has become probably the most popular of Kabalevsky's compositions and deserves to be heard more often. It is an exuberant piece full of exciting rhythms and memorable tunes with a marvellous variety of emotions orchestrated in a wonderfully imaginative way.

Rachmaninov is of course a better known Russian composer. His 3rd Piano Concerto was composed in 1909 with the composer himself soloist in the first performance the same year. Considered to be one of the most technically difficult concertos in the repertoire, it has become almost as popular with audiences as his 2nd concerto and based on the life of pianist David Helfgott. We are especially fortunate to have as our soloist internationally acclaimed pianist Marco Fatichenti, who amongst other commitments, teaches at Wellington College where some of his highly regarded recordings were made.

Our third Russian composer, Stravinsky, wrote his "Petrushka" Ballet Suite in 1911 for Diaghilev, with Nijinsky in the title role as the love struck puppet. Stravinsky revised the work in 1947. The setting for the story is the Shrovetide Fair in St Petersburg in the 1830s telling the story of the loves and jealousies of three puppets brought to life by the Charlatan. The sad-faced clown Petrushka loves the ballerina, who prefers the third puppet, an arrogant Moor. The 4 scenes depict a variety of characters in


the fairground culminating in the 'death' of Petrushka. The music is full of exciting and complex rhythms as well as some wellknown tunes.

Tickets for the concert are on sale at Decor Interiors in Crowthorne High Street, and The Information Centre, Wokingham Town Hall, £13 in advance (£15 on the door). Online purchases can be made via our website.

The orchestra welcomes new members subject to vacancies if you are interested and are a competent player, even if you have taken a break from playing, please get in touch. Our regular membership is now over sixty players and we have a reputation as a friendly bunch with members of all ages. Weekly rehearsals are on Mondays in term time from 7.45-10pm at Oaklands Junior School, Butler Road, Crowthorne. We currently have over 150 Barkham households on the list.

In March the Parish Council and local resident volunteers spent time giving Barkham a thorough spring clean by litter picking. Each year the litter pick throws up some interesting objects which have been discarded, this year we could almost have rebuilt the front end of a car with the different car parts we found in Bearwood Road and a huge number of cigarette ends. Anyway, it was a nice morning, not too cold and we enjoyed being out and about.

Barkham's roads look lovely for a short time and then the litter magically appears once again, in fact we had only been away from Bearwood Road for a couple of hours after the litter pick when a Costa coffee cup and lid appeared at the junction with Barkham Road. I just don't understand the mentality of some people - they obviously don't live in Barkham.

So, I started to think about how we might be able to keep Barkham looking lovely all year round. I try to walk each day, apparently it will make me live longer. It makes me feel good and I can think about all sorts of things as I enjoy walking through the different seasons. As I walk along Bearwood Road, through The Lilacs, Sandy Lane and Barkham Road and home again, I note litter which has been abandoned.
