

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


## New BVRA Website

### Planning Application: Land behind 336-350 Barkham Road

A Planning Application has been submitted which proposes demolition of 346 Barkham Road and erection of 25 dwellings behind 336-350 Barkham Road., with new access from Barkham Road. Barkham Parish Council has objected to this application on the grounds that it is located outside the settlement boundary. This parcel of land is named as a reserve site in the MDD and should not be built on until after 2026.

### Borough Councillor's Report

I hope everybody has had a good summer break and even for those who could not get away the weather has helped with all the local fairs and events and hopefully this has recharged the batteries.

The borough council will be back into full swing dealing with the major development applications in the borough and the regeneration of the town centre which has now started.

We will also be burning the midnight oil trying to find the savings forced on us by the reduction in the government grant we receive, even though we are the worst funded council in the UK as far as the government grants are concerned. The saving year on year will need to be in the region of £8million, at the same time we will be ensuring we preserve the services we provide in the borough.

Some residents may have received letters, addressed purely to the household, or a telephone call stating that the company has 'identified that their property is likely to be in the incorrect council tax band' and offering reductions of around £300 per year as well as a lump sum from when they moved into the property, or from 1993 when council tax banding was introduced.

# Working together to create a Neighbourhood Plan

This note is aimed at businesses in Barkham but is included in the Newsletter so that all residents can be aware of this aspect of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Arborfield and Newland and Barkham Parish Councils are jointly formulating a Neighbourhood Plan that will take advantage of the opportunities to provide facilities and opportunities in the area through the Localism Act. Residents took part in a survey last year and as a result a number of working groups have been set up to look at issues ranging from transport and education to community facilities and employment, all of which will influence the way Arborfield

Garrison Strategic Development Location (SDL) is developed.

The Employment Working Group has decided to approach local businesses operating in the vicinity of the two parishes to find out the problems and issues that concern them and ways that employment opportunities could be encouraged. With the major redevelopment at Arborfield Garrison there will be a reduction in employment locally, and as a result potentially new provision, especially for starter businesses and the self-employed.

In order that we can carefully assess your business requirements, you are invited not only

to complete this questionnaire but also to consider joining the working group. Simply email [clerk@barkham-parishcouncil.org.uk](mailto:clerk@barkham-parishcouncil.org.uk) to get more details of this group or any other.

This questionnaire has already been delivered to all Barkham businesses of which we are aware, but you can complete it online via the Survey link on [www.barkham-parishcouncil.org.uk](http://www.barkham-parishcouncil.org.uk) or directly via [www.surveymonkey.com/s/5HVGJX7](http://www.surveymonkey.com/s/5HVGJX7). *The information will be used solely to provide non-attributable statistics and will not be passed to third parties. Please respond by FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 27th.*

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However, these companies charge a fee of around 30% + VAT for something that residents can investigate themselves – for free.

If you believe you are in the wrong band, then all you need to do is contact the Valuation Office Agency, who are responsible for setting and reviewing council tax bands on all domestic properties, explaining why you believe it is incorrect and it will be reviewed – for free.

Although the service these companies are offering is not illegal, it is just as simple for residents to carry out the process themselves by contacting the Valuation Office Agency (VOA) on 03000 503 600 or by visiting the [VOA website](#) where full details on how to challenge council tax bands are available.

## Arborfield Development

Over 640 residents have submitted comments to the council on the MOD planning application which the council is currently evaluating. Traffic was one of the biggest issues due to the adverse impact additional traffic would have on the inadequate local roads in and around Barkham and surrounding areas.

I will be following this with interest as I believe there are a number of errors in the planning application which I know the planning staffs are in the process of trying to resolve with the applicant.

While this is on-going the council have proposed a route for the Bypass at Arborfield and this will also be subject to a separate consultation (see page 6).

One last point on planning by the time you are reading this the council should have approval for the final part of the documentation which supports our core

strategy document which helps with the control of development in the borough. This will hopefully avoid unsuitable development in the Borough and help us to defend our position at appeals against any developer who put forward applications for unsustainable or unsuitable development in the borough.

## Arborfield Relief Road

Wokingham Borough Council will start a consultation on Arborfield Relief Road options in September. This follows an examination of four main route options with various sub variants.

This is important for all of us in Barkham, even if at first sight it may seem remote.

- A well thought out solution will absorb traffic from the Arborfield Garrison development and minimise impact on Barkham Roads. Ideally this would depend upon a well-designed layout in the vicinity of the Langley Common roundabout and Biggs Lane, so as to encourage traffic emerging from the Arborfield Garrison to use the relief road rather than the existing road network – in particular Langley Common Road.
- Potentially a well-designed solution will also avoid the need to “upgrade” Barkham Road with traffic lights at the Bull, Bearwood Road and Edneys Hill, as was proposed by the Arborfield Garrison developers.
- A poorly designed solution could result in much more traffic travelling through the

parish. This will happen if routes out of the Arborfield Garrison are circuitous.

The Borough revealed their ‘technically’ preferred route at a forum held at Henry Street Garden Centre last month. This route would start at the Langley Common Road roundabout, hugging the west side of Arborfield village and re-joining the A327 near Pudding Lane Nursery and with an extension to the B3030 (Sindlesham Road/Mole Road).

Not surprisingly it was poorly received by Arborfield residents as the route comes near to existing housing.

Unfortunately the Borough made no attempt to indicate what mitigation in terms of noise and landscaping barriers might be possible, or any proposals to improve environment in the village centre. It was explained simply in terms of traffic management.

At the Wokingham Borough Council Executive later in July, it was decided to consult on all the routes included in the original study. The four main routes are outlined below. (It is confusing that the consultants have used a different numbering scheme compared with the initial proposals that some of you may have seen.) There may well be further variations or alterations in the final consultation documents.

### Route A

This is the ‘technically’ preferred option as outlined above. It does start at the Langley Common roundabout, which is a good thing for Barkham. (A variant would start a bit further north, near the British Legion club.) Surprisingly it includes a north-

ern extension round Lockey Farm linking to Mole Road. This will encourage even more traffic along this narrow and winding route and will increase congestion at the two roundabouts at Sindlesham and in Mill Lane – a bad thing for Barkham. As already noted, this is not popular with Arborfield residents given its juxtaposition to the village.

### Route B

This route also begins at the Langley Common roundabout and re-joins the A327 near Farley Farm, just south of the bridge across the Loddon. It would be well away from Arborfield village, to the west of the Henry Street garden centre. This route would then provide a link to the proposed Shinfield relief road. This seems to be the best route for providing Arborfield Garrison with direct routes towards Reading and the M4 eastbound and westbound, while avoiding the use of residential roads such as Langley Common Road, Barkham Road and Bearwood Road.

### Route C

The westernmost route, this would leave the A327 south of Arborfield Garrison and would re-join it on the edge of Shinfield near the Magpie and Parrott. At this point it would link directly into the Shinfield Road. This route would be very ineffective in attracting traffic from the Arborfield Garrison as the start point is too far south. As a consequence traffic from Arborfield Garrison would mainly use the existing routes through Arborfield Village and along Langley Common Road.

## Route D

This is an eastern route, starting from the Langley Common roundabout, crossing School Road and then winding round the east of Arborfield to meet the A327 north of Lockey Farm. (A variant also begins near the British Legion club.) Route D would be quite a problem for Barkham as it is quite circuitous which would make routes via Langley Common Road and Bearwood Road a relatively attractive option to reach the M4. Also, unless the A327 through Arborfield Village was restricted, traffic for Reading could still be tempted to take the shorter route through the Village. It would also run close to housing in the Langley Common Road and School Road areas – transferring the problem from the west of Arborfield. The junction with School Road would have potential congestion and safety problems, particularly in relation to The Coombes School. The alternative would be to truncate School Road, making it into two separate culs de sac.

While it is to be welcomed that that the Borough is prepared to invest in this new road, it is worrying that there does not seem to be a coherent plan to improve traffic circulation in the wider area. For example the willingness to pour yet more traffic into Winnersh seems remarkable. It also seems to be a wasted opportunity to link the Shinfield relief road into the poorly designed Blackboy roundabout, rather than using an alternative junction with the Lower Earley relief road to provide alternative routes to reach the M4 via junctions 10 or 11.


There will be a static exhibition showing the various options at Henry Street Garden Centre

from 9 Sept – 2 Nov and also at Barkham Village Hall on 4 Oct (1.30 -5.30) and 5 Oct (9.30 -1.30).

I encourage residents to look at the various proposals when the consultation begins and to take the trouble to send their comments to the Borough. In my opinion, Option B is the best for Barkham, provided that there is a satisfactory layout for the northern exit from the Arborfield

Garrison, e.g. by creating a direct road from Biggs Lane to the roundabout, with traffic heading east onto Langley Common Road either being forced to backtrack via the roundabout itself or alternatively having lights at the Biggs Lane junction that prioritises traffic turning out of the Arborfield Garrison towards the relief road.

We were hugely grateful to the Headmaster, Patrick Pritchett, and others at the Coombes CE Primary School who once again allowed us to run HBC on their field, and to borrow so much of their equipment for the week as well. I've said it before and I'll say it again: it's very hard to imagine how we could ever do it without all the support we receive from the school, the Parish Council, and various others in the local community.

We run a morning programme for under-5s and their parents or carers, and a longer programme for children up to the age



of 14. Once again the numbers signed up took us by surprise. What is particularly exciting is to see more and more children coming from the very local area (and particularly from the Coombes School). We had to pray hard for more people from our churches to join the team, in order to cope with so many who wanted to come, and were very grateful for all those who answered the call, meaning that we didn't have to turn too many children away.

Of course it was exhausting. But once again it was a privilege to be

able to serve the local community in this way. And it is such a thrill to see youngsters of all ages being given the opportunity to think through the message of Christianity for themselves. I think my favourite quote of the week came from the child who told her parents 'My leader makes learning about God so much fun!'

And now it's just four months until the planning begins all over again...

# Improve an older home

1. Effect of EPC ratings on house prices  
Improve an old home in England from EPC G to A/B rating and its value increases by an average 14% says a June 2013 [DECC report](#). This is fantastic news for people who have retrofitted their homes. However, an April 2013 [EU report](#) found no increase in house values in Oxford (p115) so expect regional differences. The DECC report says that houses with better EPC ratings on average have a higher sale price per square metre, when other factors (including built form, age and geographical region) are eliminated. However, the report cautions that this should not be seen as simply cause and effect, as homes that have higher EPCs are more likely, for example, to have had other home improvement, such as refitted kitchens, which increase the value.

## 2. The Big Picture

The UK government set a target of a 60% carbon reduction by 2050 in 2005 (this was subsequently increased to 80%). The UK's 25 million homes currently account for 27% of UK carbon emissions. It is estimated that as many as 80% of all homes that will be standing in 2050 have already been built. This means that retrofitting existing homes is a priority if the government's target is to be met. The Government's Green Deal, which will offer loans for energy efficiency improvements, launched in January 2013. Repayments will be on a 'pay as you save' basis, helping overcome any upfront financial obstacles to making the improvements.

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
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
